SEI Lecture 2018: The annual SEI Lecture will be held this year on Thursday 11 October at 5.30 pm in Parliament Hall, South Street, St Andrews. Professor Elaine Graham, Grosvenor Research Professor of Practical Theology, University of Chester and Canon Theologian of Chester Cathedral, will deliver a paper entitled 'Liberating the Laity: a Theology for a Learning Church'. The Lecture, sponsored by St Mary's College, the School of Divinity, University of St Andrews, is open to all free of charge and will be followed by a reception. This is the third in the lecture series, the first two having been given by Professor Mike Higton of Durham University and Professor David Jasper of Glasgow University.

From the Diocese of Brechin: First year ordinand Roxanne Campbell writes: It was a privilege to be back among my sending church to preach for Vocations Sunday. Preaching to a congregation who are already familiar with my own call narrative, I had the opportunity to speak about discipleship and our primary vocation as Christians to embodying the image of God which is in each of us. I spoke of how our individual call involves risking ourselves in the midst of reality, discovering God's holiness within us and others, and vulnerability, but that each and every one of us, as disciples, live with the assurance that God has made us into the kind of people who can do the kind of work that builds God's kingdom. It was a wonderful opportunity and I was so thankful for the support and tangible graciousness of the community around me.

From the Diocese of Argyll and the Isles: First year ordinand Thomas Ware and his fiancée Julia spent a weekend with the Revd Amanda Fairclough in the West Highland Region. They enjoyed hiking in the area on the Saturday, and then spent a full day across the six charges on the Sunday. Thomas preached, served and acted as deacon at the 10:30 service at St Mary's Glencoe, followed by a café lunch with members of the congregation. They then toured the rest of the group of charges looking in on St Paul's Kinlochleven, St Bride's North Ballachulish, St John's Ballachulish and St Adamnan's Duror, before heading over to Holy Cross Portnacrois where Thomas led and precented Choral Evensong. Dr Paul Stollard, Lay Reader at St James the Less, Goldenacre (Diocese of Edinburgh) and the Revd Sarah Shaw, Rector of Christ Church Falkirk (Diocese of Edinburgh), both recent graduates of TISEC/SEI, led two sessions entitled 'God on the ground: formation bearing fruit in ministry'. Dr Daphne Audsley, Assistant Officer for the Protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults, led thought-provoking sessions on 'Towards a theology of safeguarding' and 'Practical safeguarding'.
